

- Can we do more to address the housing and food security crisis? What are we doing well?









STRATEGY 1

Expand and scale community-based holistic care and services through sustainable and equitable community capacity building and service coordination.

STRATEGY 2

Utilize behavioral health responses for individual experiencing mental health and/or substance use disorders, homelessness, and other situations caused by unmet needs; avoid and minimize law enforcement responses.

STRATEGY 3

Support and deliver meaningful pre-trial release and diversion services.

STRATEGY 4

Provide effective treatment services in alternative placements, instead of jail time.

STRATEGY 5

Effectively coordinate the implementation of ATI recommendations, ensuring that strategies work to eliminate racial disparities and to authentically engage and compensate system-impacted individuals.



Southern California Association of Government (SCAG) Planning Grant Opportunity

Planning assistance to help jurisdictions implement and adopt Housing Sustainability Districts, Workforce Housing Opportunity Zones, and Housing Supportive Tax Increment Financing Districts

HICP Endorsement

Examples include:

- Planning assistance to help jurisdictions implement AB 73, through the use of incentives to create housing on infill sites near public transportation, including fair housing analysis, identifying potential areas for affordable housing, and developing equity-based housing policies and programs.
- Planning assistance to help jurisdictions implement SB 540, through the use of streamlining the housing approval process by having cities identify Workforce Housing Opportunity Zones and completing up-front planning focused on employment and affordable housing in areas close to jobs, transit, and result in reduced VMT.
- Planning assistance to help jurisdictions implement tax increment financing districts that will result in accelerating housing production, through the development of infrastructure improvements to support infill housing and transit-oriented mixed-use development.
